#### **Exciting Events on the Horizon**




A fun fact, Isabel de Castilla Altamirano the 3<sup>rd</sup> cousin of Agustín de la Torre Altamirano, her husband (named Juan de Zaldívar Mendoza) was the great-great grandson of Hernán Cortés.

Isabel de Castilla Altamirano is the third cousin of Agustin de la Torre Altamirano.

If you recall from previous articles in the NMGS Journal, Nicolasa de Valdés Altamirano, the wife of José (Joseph) de Quintana, was the granddaughter of Agustín de la Torre Altamirano. Nicolasa and José's son José (Joseph) married Antonia Luján and were the progenitors of many Quintana New Mexicans.



This is an example of reconstructing a family using Puebla Baptisms and marriage records. Also, what can we determine from these records.

Cristóbal Hurtado married Ana de Quirós about 1574. They had the following children (all records are found at Catedral de Puebla, unless otherwise stated):

- 1. Francisco Hurtado, born about 1575 and married María de Hinojosa on April 25, 1595.
- 2. Diego Hurtado was baptized December 21, 1580, godfather Francisco Hurtado. Diego married Mariana (María) de Villavicencio on March 20, 1611.
- 3. Catalina Hurtado was baptized June 26, 1583, gp/ Salvador Martinez y Isabel de Ortega, his wife.
- 4. Sebastián Hurtado, born about 1584, married Mariana de Ulloa on February 8, 1616.
- 5. Juan Hurtado, baptized September 15, 1585, gp/ Marcos Rodriguez y doña Catalina de Galvez, his wife.
- 6. Gaspar Hurtado, baptized January 14, 1592, gp/ Juan de Solis y Isabel Flores, his wife.
- 7. Agustín Hurtado, baptized September 3, 1589, gp/ Diego de Carmona, regidor y Maria Gomez, his wife.

We can estimate that Cristóbal Hurtado was born about 1552 and married about 1574. He died before February 8, 1616, when their son Sebastián got married. Ana de Quirós was born about 1556 and she died before March 20, 1611 when their son Diego Hurtado got married.

Finally, Cristóbal Hurtado **might be** related to the family of Alonso Soltero which Jose Antonio Esquibel wrote about in HGRC volumes 14 & 15.








#### Congratulations to Daria and Native Bound Unbound.


