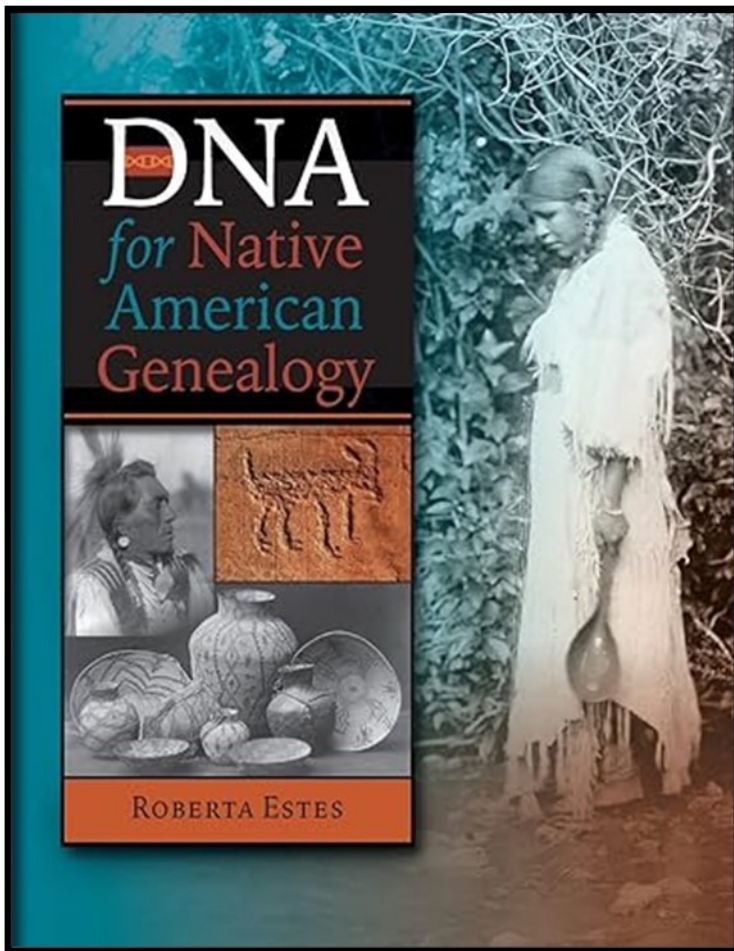

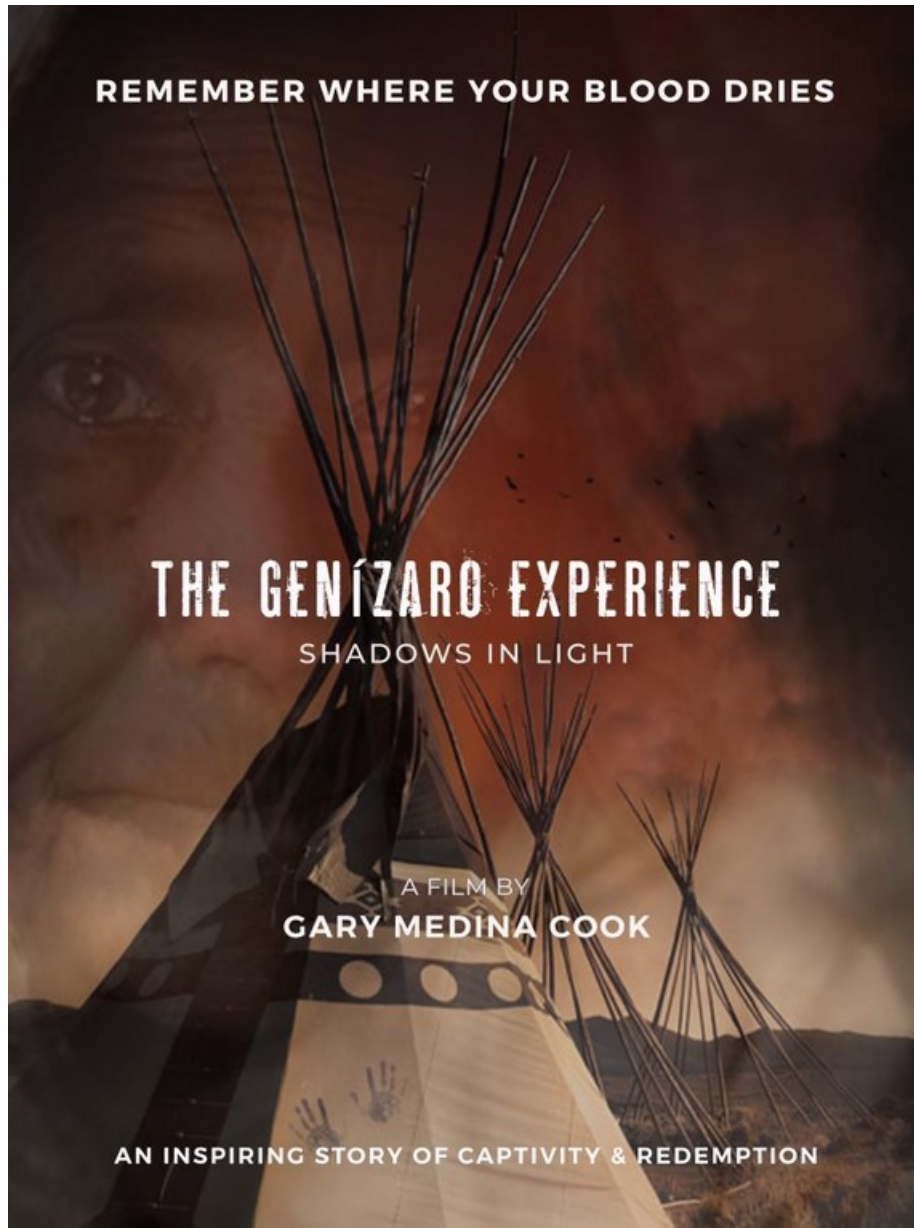

## What's new with FamilyTree DNA since the last Conference 4.5 years ago?

- New tools in the Big Y-700 Toolbox (Discover™)
- More FamilyTree DNA Blogs: Subscribe to Blog
- Increased FamilyTree DNA Social Media presence
- FamilyTree DNA Website adding additional languages: ¡Ahora en Español!
- Payment Features now include convenient Gift Cards and PayPal

## What are they working on now?

FamilyTreeDNA has hinted that they are working on several new features, but the launch dates will be delayed due to the **present emergency situation** caused by the recent data breach with 23andme (and Home Depot and Target). Note: FamilyTreeDNA is less vulnerable to this type of attack because they use Kit numbers, not email addresses. Users should not reuse passwords.

Family Tree is being proactive and taking precautionary measures by:

1. Forcing a password reset for GAP (Group Administrator Page)
  - a. They are considering a forced reset for ALL user accounts as well. If you are a kit manager, **DON'T GET LOCKED OUT!** Make sure your email is listed on the Account. Also fill out the Beneficiary form and kit manager information.
2. Requiring 2 Factor Authentication (2FA) for GAP accounts.
3. Pausing the ability to download match and segment data until 2FA is in place.
4. Changes to Group Administrator Permissions
  - a. Ability to download data (matches, segments, raw data)
  - b. Purchasing tests for members kits

Current Admins with permissions will be grandfathered in. Future kit owners will have to opt IN to allow administrators these permissions. Opt Out will be the default. New members will have to opt themselves IN.

5. Until further notice, FamilyTreeDNA is no longer accepting 23andMe© autosomal transfers.

Current customers who have transferred their 23andMe results will not be affected in any way. We apologize for any inconvenience that may result from this action, but hope you understand the decision was made after much discussion and out of an abundance of caution.

## Pending New Releases:

1. Y-DNA Haplogroups for FamilyFinder Customers will be intermediate level haplogroups - Metal ages.
2. New Discover updates and new reports:
  - a. Big Y- Study Connections – connections to living people.
3. Mito Project – New Mito Tree - building a brand new haplotree for mtDNA that will show newer and younger Haplogroup branches which will be more helpful to our genealogies! Join the Million Mito Project by testing Full Sequence mtDNA.
4. mtDNA Discover Haplogroup Reports – will have the same features as the Big Y-700 FamilyTreeDNA Discover

## The Future:

1. More than a dozen states have passed or introduced new Genetic and Data Privacy Laws.

5. Infrastructure changes to Big Y-700. How to improve matching, lab test processing times, etc.

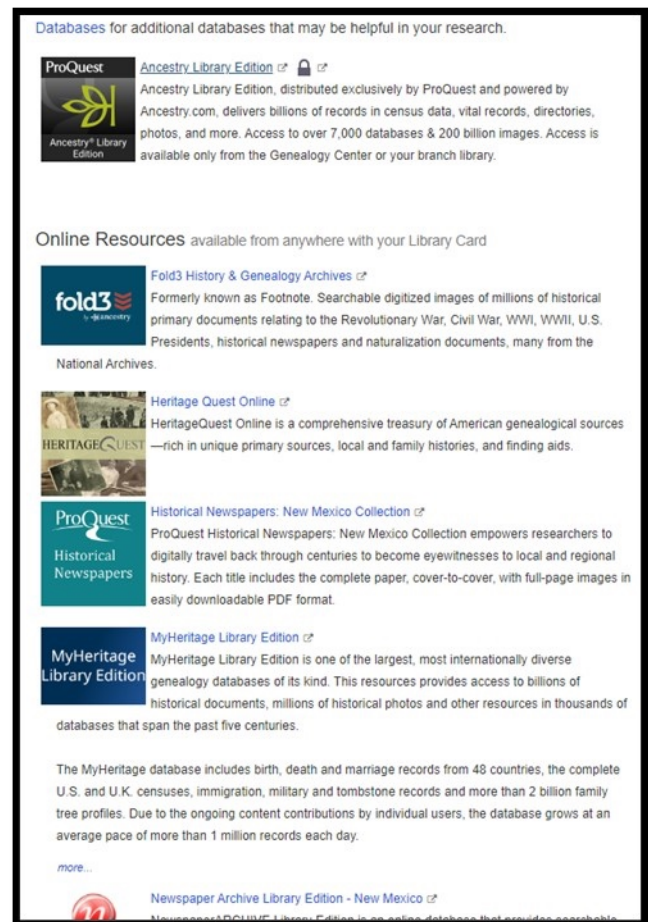
# ALBUQUERQUE PUBLIC LIBRARY

On October 25th, Lisa Kindrick, the Chief Genealogy Librarian, spoke to my DAR Chapter. I was amazed at all the new bits of info researchers have access to with your library card. The key is to have an Albuquerque Public Library card. You can get one at any one of their locations.

The left side panel has the materials you can click on and access. Online databases have some limitations, but they are worth using to see if you like them and will use them. Some allow you to have your own pages, etc.





Newspaper Research has links to the available databases you can use for free. Some have limitations to just New Mexico.

These databases are of special interest to genealogists. Normally available with a subscription, they may be used for free with your library card. Select [eResources and Databases](#) for additional databases that may be helpful in your research.




**Newspaper Archive Library Edition - New Mexico** 

NewspaperARCHIVE Library Edition is an online database that provides searchable access to New Mexico newspapers. Every part of every page is searchable, including valuable local articles, advertisements, editorials, classified ads, and obituaries. The collection contains over 128 different newspapers from across New Mexico. The archives cover New Mexico history from 1847-2019 and allow you to further understand an ancestor's place within their local community to research your genealogy. Start your New Mexico ancestry search now and discover more about your ancestor's stories!

A microfiche index for the *Albuquerque Journal* is available at the Genealogy Center for 1976-1978 and 1989-2003. A printed index for the *Albuquerque Journal* is available at the Genealogy Center for 1979-1982. The Albuquerque Publishing Company Library has an index for the *Albuquerque Journal* for 1989-1994.

A local history card index of articles of local interest, including articles from the *Albuquerque Journal* and *Tribune*, from 1965-2000 is located at the Special Collections Library. No indexing is available for the *Albuquerque Journal* between 1983 and 1987, with the exception of the Local History File and obituaries. See the obituary tab above for more information about obituaries.


Major articles from the *Albuquerque Journal* from 1995 to the present are full-text searchable from the Library's website with a library card using Newsbank.

**Gale OneFile News (InfoTrac Newsstand)** 

This innovative full-text newspaper resource allows users to search articles instantly by title, headline, date, author, newspaper section, or other fields. InfoTrac Newsstand provides access to more than 2,300 major U.S. regional, national, and local newspapers, as well as leading titles from around the world. It also includes thousands of images, radio and TV broadcasts and transcripts.

Among many others this resource includes access to *The New York Times*, *The New York Post*, *The Christian Science Monitor*, *The Santa Fe New Mexican*, *Stars and Stripes*, *Taos News*, *USA Today*, and *The Washington Post*.

# NMGS 2020 BY-LAW REVISIONS

The NMGS 2020 By-Law changes are passed. Below are the details.

## Article IV, Section 8.

- Change the second sentence from:
  - o **An Officer may serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms, but** Board Members are not term limited.
- Change to read:
  - o **Officers and other** Board Members are not term limited.

## Article VI, Section 4.

- Added the phrase "whether paper or electronic" to change this:
  - o Elections shall be held at the Annual Business meeting. Nominations from the floor shall be called for, with the previous consent of the nominee. Voting shall be by ballot and a majority of votes cast shall be necessary for election. When there is one nominee for office, the vote may be taken by voice.
- Change to read:
  - o Elections shall be held at the Annual Business meeting. Nominations from the floor shall be called for, with the previous consent of the nominee. Voting shall be by ballot, **whether paper or electronic**, and a majority of votes cast shall be necessary for election. When there is one nominee for office, the vote may be taken by voice.

### **José Antonio Esquibel**

#### **All Honors, Privileges, and Favors: The Great Spanish Migration to New Mexico, 1693-1697**

Most people consider the year 1598 as the beginning of Spanish Nuevomejicano history from which came the continual development of Nuevomejicano culture into the era of the U. S. government. The fact that this is not the case is revealed when we trace the branches of our various Nuevomejicano families back in time and realize that not all families trace back to 1598 New Mexico. It was during the period of 1693 to 1697 that the greatest migration of Spanish citizens into New Mexico occurred.

This presentation will examine the circumstances that brought about the recruitment of four distinct groups as settlers of New Mexico in 1692, 1693, and 1695, their places of origin, and how they were accounted for in the May 1697 census. In this presentation, participants will be able to identify the groups in which their ancestors traveled, and the distinct characteristics of the various groups, and will gain an understanding and appreciation of the foundation for the development of Nuevomejicano culture.
