Roberta Estes spoke to the Albuquerque Genealogical Society in October and she had a link that I thought was really good and it involved seeing where the haplotype is found. First go to their website at FamilyTreeDNA.com - <u>https://www.familytreedna.com/</u>

Step 2: Scroll to the bottom of the page. Under Community, click on mtDNA Haplotree or Y-DNA Haplotree. I am using my own mtDNA to work through this.

Step 3: I chose mtDNA and about the middle of the page you'll see some Alphabets or Haplotypes vertically, I clicked on C. My type is C1b11 and then off to the right you can see which countries have this type.



On the right side you can click the number with a + sign, which I did, and then you can see this report.

As a side note she had some other links for Native American DNA.







This report is based on the session titled, *Past, Present, and Future – Product and Privacy Updates and Wish List,* by Katy Rowe-Shurwanz, Product Owner, FamilyTree DNA

What's new with FamilyTree DNA since the last Conference 4.5 years ago?

- New tools in the Big Y-700 Toolbox (DiscoverTM)
- More FamilyTree DNA Blogs: Subscribe to Blog
- Increased FamilyTree DNA Social Media presence
- FamilyTree DNA Website adding additional languages: ¡Ahora en Español!
- Payment Features now include convenient Gift Cards and PayPal

What are they working on now?

FamilyTreeDNA has hinted that they are working on several new features, but the launch dates will be delayed due to the **present emergency situation** caused by the recent data breach with 23andme (and Home Depot and Target). Note: FamilyTreeDNA is less vulnerable to this type of attack because they use Kit numbers, not email addresses. Users should not reuse passwords.

Family Tree is being proactive and taking precautionary measures by:

1. Forcing a password reset for GAP (Group Administrator Page)

a. They are considering a forced reset for ALL user accounts as well. If you are a kit manager, DON'T GET LOCKED OUT! Make sure your email is listed on the Account. Also fill out the Beneficiary form and kit manager information.

- 2. Requiring 2 Factor Authentication (2FA) for GAP accounts.
- 3. Pausing the ability to download match and segment data until 2FA is in place.
- 4. Changes to Group Administrator Permissions
 - **a.** Ability to download data (matches, segments, raw data)
 - b. Purchasing tests for members kits

Current Admins with permissions will be grandfathered in. Future kit owners will have to opt IN to allow administrators these permissions. Opt Out will be the default. New members will have to opt themselves IN.

5. Until further notice, FamilyTreeDNA is no longer accepting 23andMe© autosomal transfers.

Current customers who have transferred their 23andMe results will not be affected in any way. We apologize for any inconvenience that may result from this action, but hope you understand the decision was made after much discussion and out of an abundance of caution.

Pending New Releases:

1. Y-DNA Haplogroups for FamilyFinder Customers will be intermediate level haplogroups - Metal ages.

2. New Discover updates and new reports:

a. Big Y- Study Connections – connections to living people.

3. Mito Project – New Mito Tree - building a brand new haplotree for mtDNA that will show newer and younger Haplogroup branches which will be more helpful to our genealogies! Join the Million Mito Project by testing Full Sequence mtDNA.

4. mtDNA Discover Haplogroup Reports – will have the same features as the Big Y-700 FamilyTreeDNA Discover

The Future:

1. More than a dozen states have passed or introduced new Genetic and Data Privacy Laws.

a. FamilyTreeDNA is currently reviewing the laws to see if any changes need to be made.

2. MyHeritage Tree Integration – will replace and be better than the FTDNA Tree. The process will NOT allow MyHeritage to have access to your DNA data.

3. mtDNA match lists- getting a facelift.

4. Introducing mtDNA Haplogroups for Family Finder customers.

5. Infrastructure changes to Big Y-700. How to improve matching, lab test processing times, etc.





The left side panel has the materials you can click on and access. Online databases have some limitations, but they are worth using to see if you like them and will use them. Some allow you to have your own pages, etc.

NMGS 2020 BY-LAW REVISIONS

The NMGS 2020 By-Law changes are passed. Below are the details.

Article IV, Section 8.

 \cdot Change the second sentence from:

o An Officer may serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms, but Board Members are not term limited.

 \cdot Change to read:

o Officers and other Board Members are not term limited.

Article VI, Section 4.

· Added the phrase "whether paper or electronic" to change this:

o Elections shall be held at the Annual Business meeting. Nominations from the floor shall be called for, with the previous consent of the nominee. Voting shall be by ballot and a majority of votes cast shall be necessary for election. When there is one nominee for office, the vote may be taken by voice.

 \cdot Change to read:

o Elections shall be held at the Annual Business meeting. Nominations from the floor shall be called for, with the previous consent of the nominee. Voting shall be by ballot, whether paper or electronic, and a majority of votes cast shall be necessary for election. When there is one nominee for office, the vote may be taken by voice.

José Antonio Esquibel All Honors, Privileges, and Favors: The Great Spanish Migration to New Mexico, 1693-1697

Most people consider the year 1598 as the beginning of Spanish Nuevomejicano history from which came the continual development of Nuevomejicano culture into the era of the U. S. government. The fact that this is not the case is revealed when we trace the branches of our various Nuevomejicano families back in time and realize that not all families trace back to 1598 New Mexico. It was during the period of 1693 to 1697 that the greatest migration of Spanish citizens into New Mexico occurred.

This presentation will examine the circumstances that brought about the recruitment of four distinct groups as settlers of New Mexico in 1692, 1693, and 1695, their places of origin, and how they were accounted for in the May 1697 census. In this presentation, participants will be able to identify the groups in which their ancestors traveled, and the distinct characteristics of the various groups, and will gain an understanding and appreciation of the foundation for the development of Nuevomejicano culture.


