JOURNEY THROUGH SPAIN

I took my mother, Mary Vigil Gallegos, on a three-week trip to Spain this year to focus on the areas where the Vigil and Gallegos ancestors originated. I'm sharing highlights of some of the places we visited that were of the most relevance, from a genealogical perspective.



Central town plaza of Riaza, Segovia province. This town was the birthplace of my 11x-great-grandfather Miguel Gallegos (b. circa 1535) who emigrated to New Spain before 1560.



Cathedral of Santa María de Burgos. The original cathedral was founded by my 29x-great-grandfather King Alfonso VI of Castile and León. Construction was completed in 1096, but the original Romanesque structure was destroyed to make way for a larger Gothic cathedral in the 12th century. It is the burial place of my 29x-great-grandparents Rodrigo Díaz de Vivar (the Spanish champion known as "El Cid") and his wife Jimena. Their tombs are located under the floor of the central dome.



Tombs of King Alfonso VIII and Queen Eleanor, Santa María la Real de Las Huelgas Convent, Burgos. King Alfonso died on 6 October 1214 and his wife, the queen, shortly thereafter on 31 October 1214. The tombs are decorated in their respective heraldic motifs, Alfonso's side on the left with castles spanned by trefoil arches and Eleanor's side on the right with a pointed shield bearing the three crowned lions of the Plantagenets, as she was the daughter of King Henry II of England.

Santa María la Real de Las Huelgas Convent, Burgos. The convent was founded by my 25x-great-grandfather King Alfonso VIII of Castile on 2 January 1187, granting a royal charter to the Cistercian nuns, the order which still operates it today. He and his wife, Queen Eleanor of England are buried in the church, as well as their daughter, Queen Berengaria of Castile, who was the wife of King Alfonso IX.



Sepulchre of my 18x-great-grandfather Lope González de Quirós, and his grandson, my 16x-great-grandfather Diego de Miranda, circa 1485, Archaeological Museum of Asturias, Oviedo. The tombs were originally located in the Monastery of San Francisco in Oviedo, which was demolished in 1902. The epitaph reads: "Aquí yase Lope González de Quirós fijo de / Gonçalo Bernaldo de Quirós y Diego de Mirando su nieto fijo de Martín Vásques de Quirós e doña / Inés Ponce de Miranda su muger esta sepultu / ra mando faser el dicho Diego de Miranda es este su vulto.

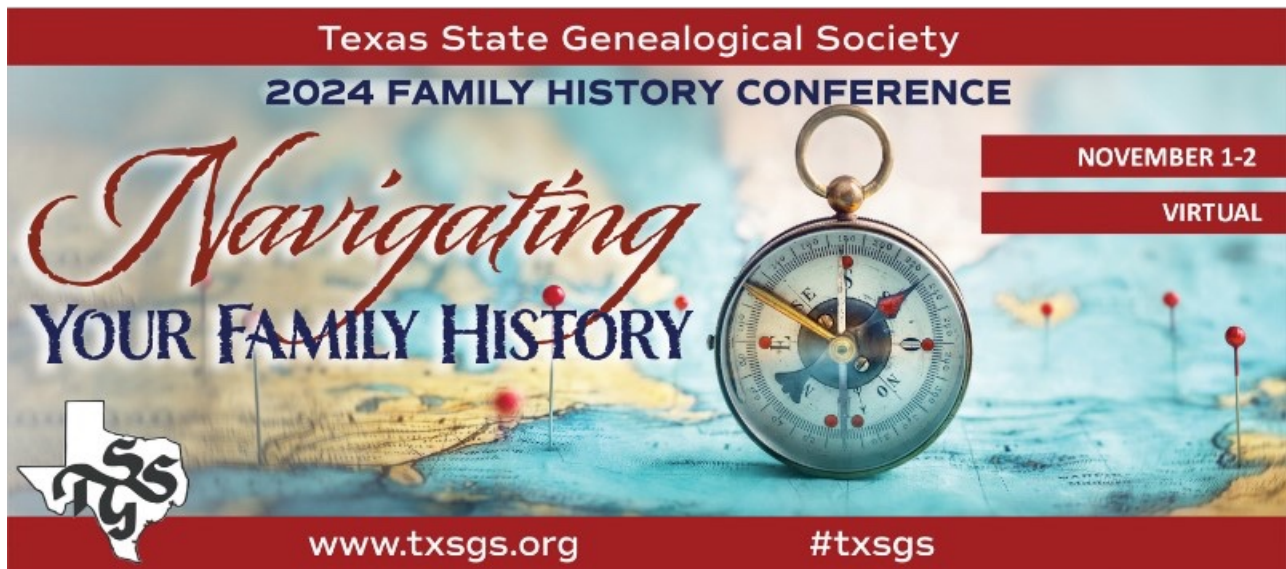
Translation: "Here lies Lope González de Quirós, son of Gonzalo Bernaldo de Quirós, and Diego de Miranda his grandson, son of Martín Vásques de Quirós and Doña Inés Ponce de Miranda his wife. Diego de Miranda had this sepulchre made and this is his face."



Torre de los Vigil, Vega de Poja, Siero. The tower and manor house were built in 1599 by Bernabé de Vigil and Catalina de Estrada, who were likely close relatives of Juan Montes Vigil I. The last photo displays the Vigil coat of arms.



Iglesia de San Martín, Vega de Poja, Siero. Given the Montes Vigil family was from the Feligresia of San Martín de Siero, I suspect this could be the church where my 11x-great-grandfather Juan Montes Vigil I was baptized. The church was founded in the 13th century but modified over the years so that the structure as it stands today is typical of rural churches of the 18th century.
